The 2023 Missouri Legislative Session ended May 12, 2023, after countless hours in committee meetings and on floor debate. Legislative members filed a total of 2,323 bills; however, most proposed legislation failed to advance. Fifty-seven bills were Truly Agreed and Finally Passed by the General Assembly and are awaiting the governor's signature.

All four of the Patrol's legislative policy priorities emerged through the session and await the governor's signature:

Patrol Records – Proposed changes allow an automated dissemination of basic crash reports. Citizens will be able to electronically submit, pay, and receive the requested report via an electronic device. This workflow will greatly increase efficiency and decrease turnaround time.

Rap Back – This provision removes the six-year re-enrollment requirement for Rap Back. Rap Back allows qualified entities in Missouri to receive ongoing status notifications of new arrests for applicants under the entity's purview. It provides a constant background check of those working in positions of public trust.

Background Checks For Recreational Marijuana Facilities – Proposed changes will establish the Department of Health and Senior Services' statutory authority to require fingerprint-based criminal history background checks for employees, contractors, owners, and volunteers of recreational marijuana facilities.

Chapter 610 RSMo, Sunshine Law – This provision creates the opportunity to close certain records relating to the safety and security of educational institutions. Also included in the proposal is language designed to strengthen the protections afforded to investigative information or information contained in suspicious activity reports.

In the February 1992 Patrol News, Colonel C.E. (Mel) Fisher provided a legislative update in his Superintendent's Message in which he wrote, "Legislative sessions always present challenges to any state agency in form of opportunities and threats." It's true that legislative sessions can prove challenging. However, more than anything, there are many great opportunities for us to educate members of the General Assembly and their constituents about our agency and the professional law enforcement services the Patrol provides to the citizens we serve.

The 2023 Legislative Session was a success due to the work our personnel do each and every day by taking advantage of their opportunity to provide quality service to the public. This outstanding work does not go unnoticed by the General Assembly, Governor's Office, and the citizens of our great state. These opportunities lead to success now and are a gateway for future success for our agency to receive the resources needed to help ensure Missouri is a safe place to live, work, and visit.

TROOPER HAWKINS HONORED FOR LIFESAVING ACTIONS

It was March 4, 2023, and Trooper Orrin D. Hawkins (E) was patrolling when he overheard Cape Girardeau Police Department radio traffic about an active shooter in a downtown bar. He immediately responded to that location. Joined by a Cape Girardeau officer, he entered the building, searched for the gunman, and began clearing the bar. While doing so, Tpr. Hawkins located two men on the floor with apparent gunshot wounds. One, who complained of being shot in the leg, shouted that the other man had shot him. The other man was unresponsive and appeared to have been shot in the abdomen and the thoracic region with an exit wound in his chest. A gun lay nearby. Tpr. Hawkins directed the Cape Girardeau officer to keep bystanders away from the gun as he began treating the unresponsive man.

Tpr. Hawkins located some paper towels and applied them to the abdomen wound. When the man's weak pulse stopped, he began cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, but saw this increased the man's bleeding. Concerned the man would bleed out, Tpr. Hawkins directed a security guard to bring him plastic wrap from the kitchen and used it to cover the chest wound. Once medical personnel arrived, Tpr. Hawkins assisted them with their evaluation and the application of chest seals to wounds in the man's thoracic region. The man was flown to a St. Louis hospital and, after undergoing multiple surgeries over several weeks, was released from intensive care and continues to recover. Tpr. Hawkins' quick response and outside-the-box thinking helped save this man's life.

To recognize his quick response and outside-the-box thinking, the Department of Public Safety named Tpr. Hawkins the May 2023 Sworn Team Member of the Month. Deputy Director Kevin Bond (DPS) presented the award at a ceremony on June 7 at Troop E Headquarters.

"I'm very proud of Tpr. Hawkins and the contributions he has made to the citizens of Missouri throughout his law

enforcement career," said Colonel Eric T. Olson during the presentation. "This case is another example of his commitment to service and excellence."

Captain Philip E. Gregory (E) also recognized Tpr. Hawkins saying, "Our officers often encounter those we serve during the most desperate times of their life. That was certainly the case here. Tpr. Hawkins performed in an exemplary manner and represented our agency well."

CRIMINALS ARE NOT WELCOME IN MISSOURI!

On December 21, 2022, Division of Drug and Crime Control Sergeant Greg D. Primm received information related to a suspect involved in a kidnap-for-ransom. He obtained a description of the suspect vehicle and possible routes of travel. Sgt. Primm then went to work and coordinated Patrol personnel to assist with locating the suspect. The vehicle was located at a gas station along Interstate 35 in Clinton County.

Trooper Josh H. Thompson later stopped the suspect vehicle after observing a traffic violation on Interstate 35 in Daviess County. The driver and four occupants of the vehicle were identified roadside, and Tpr. Thompson arrested the driver for not possessing a valid driver's license. The driver was transported to the Daviess DeKalb Regional Jail in Pattonsburg, MO.

At the jail, the driver was interviewed, and he admitted to being involved in a kidnapping-for-ransom conspiracy. Based upon subsequent interviews, Sgt. Primm and Tpr. Thompson discovered the three passengers in the suspect's vehicle were being smuggled to Minnesota. This investigation led officials to the recovery of an additional 17 individuals in Texas, some of which were locked in closets.

The superb investigation skills and teamwork of Sgt. Primm and Tpr. Thompson resulted in at least one suspect being identified and 20 individuals being rescued. Their hard work and dedication stopped the exploitation of at least 20 individuals and saved countless others.

As a result of their actions, the Department of Public Safety named them DPS Sworn Team Members of the Month for June 2023. On June 29, 2023, DPS Director Sandra K. Karsten, Colonel Eric T. Olson, and Major Mike A. Turner (Q/FOB) recognized Sgt. Primm and Tpr. Thompson for during a special presentation at Troop H Headquarters. Director Karsten and Colonel Olson expressed their gratitude and presented each officer with plaques and challenge coins.

"The effort by Sgt. Primm and Tpr. Thompson is a great example of strong commitment to serving not just the citizens of Missouri, but those in other states as well," said Col. Olson. "On behalf of the entire agency, I commend them for their perseverance and professionalism."

"This was an excellent example of what can be achieved when multiple agencies work together," said Capt. Skoglund (H). "We are grateful for Sgt. Primm and Tpr. Thompson's actions, initiative, and commitment to protecting victims."

During the award ceremony, Tpr. Thompson thanked Sgt. Primm for his leadership and guidance.

Sgt. Primm stated, "I'm still excited to be a cop." He wants every criminal to know they are not welcome in Missouri.

Patrol Welcomes 11 NEW TROOPERS

At the first chime from St. Peter Catholic Church's bell, the Patrol's command staff and dignitaries filed in and took their places, while troop commanders and Academy instructors wound their way down the Capitol steps to their seats on the south lawn. Cue the entrance of the 117th Recruit Class, which marched to a cadence to their front row seats. The stage was set: It was time for graduation exercises for the 117th Recruit Class to begin.

Captain Joe Armistead (Q/TND) served as emcee and welcomed everyone in attendance. The Troop F Color Guard presented the flags and Sergeant Andrew A. Henry (H) sang the national anthem. Pastor Doug Richey, Pisgah Baptist Church, Excelsior Springs, MO, provided both invocation and benediction.

"In a few moments, when I administer your oath, something profound will happen," said the Honorable Patricia Breckenridge, during her keynote address. "Who you are will change forever. You will be a member of the MSHP. Being a Missouri state trooper isn't something you do, it is who you are."

Justice Breckenridge encouraged

the new troopers to, "Take a quiet moment and ask yourself what it means to be a state trooper." She told them they were entering into a special relationship with every other state trooper. "Everything you do reflects on them, and everything they do reflects on you. Live your life professionally and how you want society to think of all state troopers."

Justice Breckenridge directed the new troopers to live by the Patrol's Core Values. "If you commit to be a person of integrity, you are more likely to do the right thing both in moments of crisis and after deliberation ... Look around this gallery and around your troop. Identify the best examples and model yourselves after them."

Justice Breckenridge then administered the Oath of Office to the new troopers.

After the class was commissioned, Colonel Eric T. Olson addressed the new troopers. He encouraged them to never lose sight of their opportunity to serve. He encouraged them by stressing that although extreme opinions are often heard, the majority of Missourians are supportive of what troopers do. "When you report to your first shift, remember your commitment, and most importantly, return home safely." He closed by congratulating the class and saying he,

the command staff, troop commanders, and zone sergeants are committed to providing the quality training and support the new troopers need.

The class awards were presented by Col. Olson with Justice Breckenridge. Trooper Levi G. Tiller accepted the Academics Award, Physical Fitness Award, and Superintendent's Award. Trooper John K. Rizer accepted the Firearms Award.

The class commander, Tpr. Tiller, spoke on behalf of his class, expressing their appreciation for family support, instructors, and civilian Academy staff. He then spoke directly to his classmates, "... let us not forget the responsibility we bear. We are the guardians of justice entrusted with the duty to safeguard the innocent, to defend the vulnerable, and uphold the principles that uphold a just society. Together, we have the power to affect positive change, to continue the great tradition of this great agency, and to set the example for those who will follow us. Let us always strive to be the best versions of ourselves." He reminded those present of the Patrol's Core Values and told his fellow graduates, "May we carry these values with us and inspire others to do the same."

TROOPERS REFLECT ON ACADEMY EXPERIENCE

Three representatives of the 117th Recruit Class took time to provide some insight into the group's experience at the Patrol's Law Enforcement Academy. Recently commissioned Troopers Hunter L. Rivera, John R. Rizer, and Levi G. Tiller sat and talked with me a couple weeks prior to graduation. The troopers felt part of a small recruit class was beneficial regarding the stages of team development and said they all got along well.

"The good thing about having a small class is when one struggles, we pick each other up," said Tpr. Rivera.

All of them spoke highly of the training they received.

"The level of training here is far above the training I received prior to coming here," said Tpr. Rizer.

Yet, some classes resonated more than others.

For Tpr. Rivera, it was tactical communication, taught by Sergeant Andy A. Armstrong. "Sgt. Armstrong taught us how to speak with people and not make them angry, to be aware of what you say to people and how it might come across to them."

Tpr. Tiller pointed to Corporal Chad A. Heil and traffic law. "It's a big part of our job and a lengthy subject. The way Cpl. Heil taught the class was engaging and he thought outside the box. He made the material as interesting as possible while still getting the information across."

"Cpl. Heil made us excited to come to class for one of the most boring subjects," agreed Tpr. Rivera.

"I've had DWI training in the past, and Cpl. [Ryan L.] Hutton is a wealth of knowledge. The way he brought his enthusiasm to class every day, you could tell it meant something more to him than simply working a DWI."

The members of the 117th Recruit Class look forward to reaching their assignments.

"I'm going to a busy zone," said Tpr. Rivera. "It will be a good place to see how things actually work rather than

seeing it on paper. It'll be good experience."

"I look forward to going to work every day committing myself to a process that is more than training," said Tpr. Tiller, "... getting to know the people in my zone, and developing as a trooper."

Tpr. Rizer will complete his training with a field training officer on the road, then transfer to marine operations. He is looking forward to working in a place with which he is familiar alongside his best friend, Trooper Casey A. Marks (F), who graduated with the 114th Recruit Class. Once assigned, Tpr. Marks called him and said, "You gotta do this!"

There are things the 117th Recruit Class members won't miss about life at the Academy. Having more control over their daily schedule was a much-anticipated part of graduating. However, before they leave the Academy, the class wanted to give a shoutout to Captain Mike A. Petlansky (Q/WPD) and Trooper R. Mike Malone (Q/RCOD). These two officers

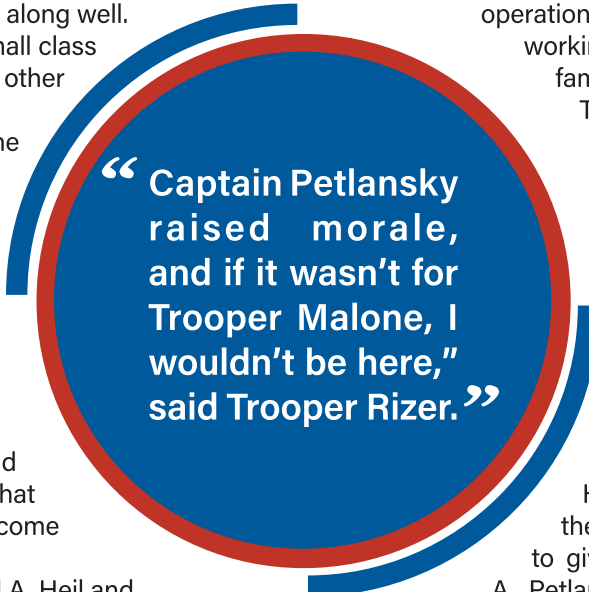
voluntarily ran five miles each Friday morning alongside the class.

PATROL HISTORY



TRIVIA

Lee [Porter] and I (retired Capt. Ashurst) were conducting an undercover narcotic investigation in New Madrid County in the early 1970s. We had just made a purchase of marijuana from a dealer in the city of New Madrid [MO], and before we could leave town, we were stopped by the New Madrid Police Department. I don't recall the exact details of the stop, but the officers found our purchase. We were soon en route to the city jail. We did not try to identify ourselves to the officers, because of information we had previously received that one of their officers could not be trusted.

We were placed in a jail cell and after what seemed like several hours (probably about 15 minutes) Trooper Melvin E. Duckworth arrived along with FBI Agent Bill Burton. It appeared that they had been called in to interrogate Porter and me. As soon as I was alone with Tpr. Duckworth, I explained the situation of who we were and what had occurred. (It should be noted that

Tpr. Duckworth eventually became director of the Division of Drug and Crime Control and retired with the rank of major.) He told me that the officers who had arrested us were trustworthy. After some discussion between all of the officers involved, Tpr. Duckworth returned to our cell and told me that it had been agreed that we would be released to the custody of Agent Burton and Tpr. Duckworth to supposedly be transported to the county jail in Mauldin, MO.

The police chief had asked him if we were carrying weapons. I informed Tpr. Duckworth that we both had guns in our boots and Lee had a switchblade knife in his pocket. The chief did not take this news very well and was somewhat upset with the arresting officers. We later learned that the police were informed we had marijuana in our vehicle by the dealers who sold it to us. Their motive in having us arrested was to see if we were narcotics officers.

Retired Lieutenant Ed N. Moses is gathering information about the history of the Patrol's Narcotics Unit. While researching, he interviewed retired Captain Robert E. Ashurst, the agency's first narcotics officer, who shared this personal story with him.

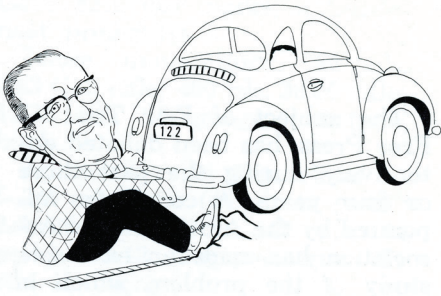

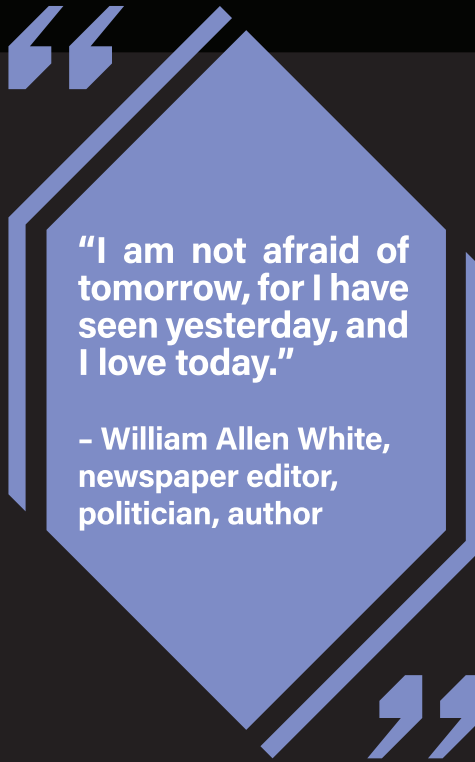


45 YEARS AGO AUGUST 1978

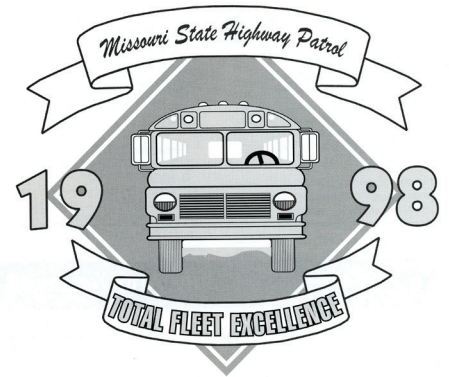

The Motor Vehicle Inspection Division unveiled its School Bus Fleet Excellence Award. The program was modeled after a program used in Michigan. It was intended as an incentive for school bus fleets to maintain buses that pass the initial Patrol inspection with a 95 percent or better score. Excellent fleets received stickers to affix on the uppermost portion of the bus's first window behind the service door. (This program is still in effect today.)

The Division of Drug and Crime Control produced and sold a cookbook to raise money for families in need. This issue announced the Officer of the Year award had been named after Sergeant Benjamin O. 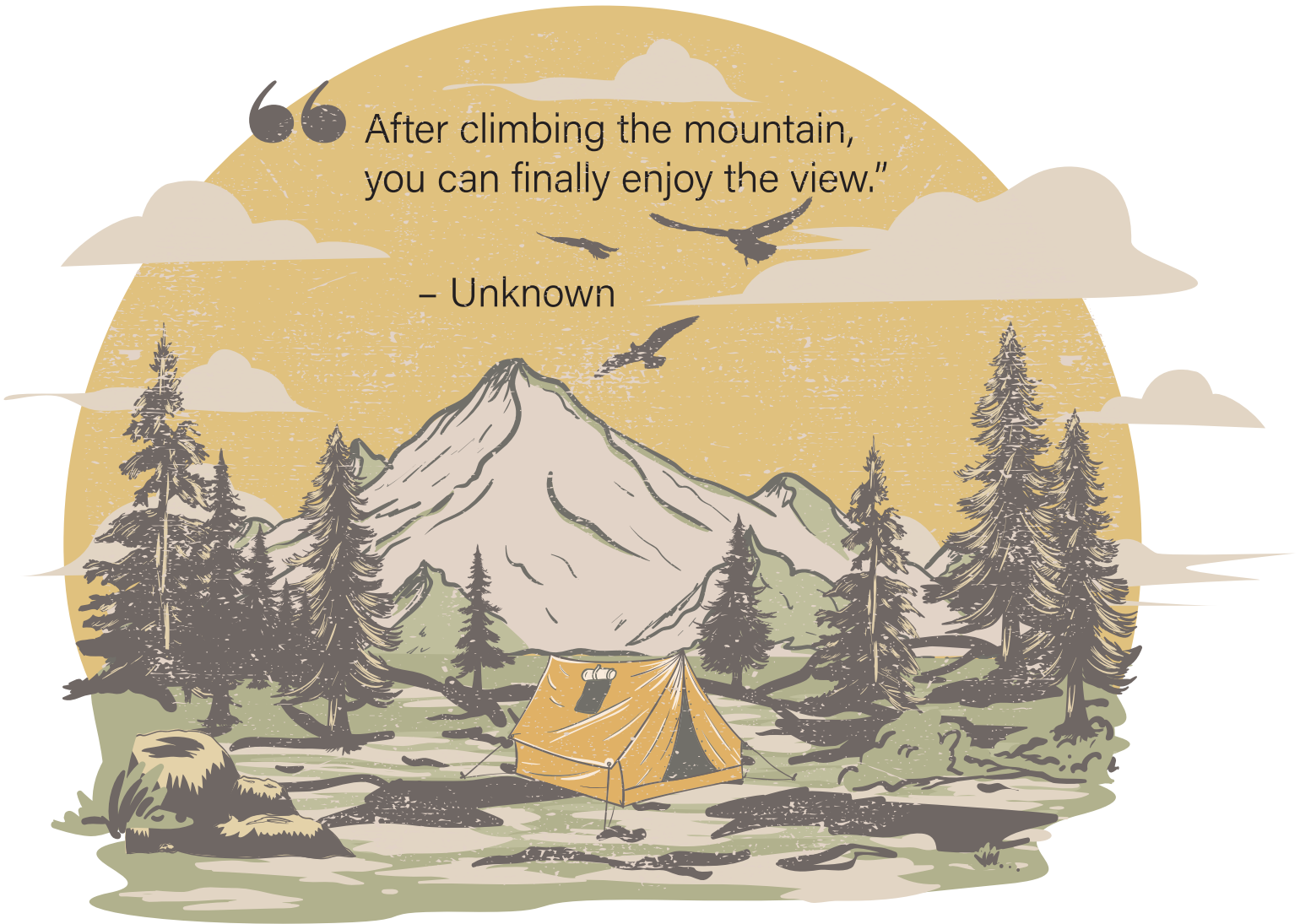

Cpl. Barrett Recognized For HISTORIC ARREST

On Friday May 12, 2023, Director Sandra K. Karsten, Department of Public Safety, Colonel Eric T. Olson, and Major Mike A. Turner (Q/FOB) presented Corporal Tim A. Barrett (D) with the May 2023 Team Member of the Month award at Troop D Headquarters in Springfield, Missouri. Cpl. Barrett's wife, Jessica, was present to celebrate his being honored.

In 2022, Cpl. Barrett's dedication to criminal patrol work resulted in a historic criminal arrest, with the following details:

At approximately 12:20 a.m. November 29, 2022, Cpl. Barrett stopped an eastbound vehicle for excessive speed on Interstate 44. What started as a normal traffic stop changed, as Cpl. Barrett observed several occurrences of suspicious behavior, and during his conversation with the driver. A subsequent search of the vehicle resulted in the seizure of 170 pounds of crystal methamphetamine, three handguns, cocaine, and marijuana. It is believed to be the largest seizure

ever of methamphetamine in the state of Missouri. This arrest led to a nexus with a large, nationwide cocaine trafficking organization under investigation by the Drug Enforcement Administration. Cpl. Barrett undoubtedly made Missouri's highways safer, as well as our communities, with this arrest. A seizure of this nature impacts the safety of thousands of citizens in many states. During the ceremony Colonel Eric Olson congratulated Cpl. Barrett and said, "The true impact of the seizure was difficult to measure."

"Cpl. Barrett relied upon his training and followed his instincts during this traffic stop, where he took the time to look beyond the initial stop," said Capt. D. Scott Sater. "His investigative efforts led to one of the largest roadside methamphetamine seizures in the state of Missouri. This is an outstanding example of great police work, and clearly, Cpl. Barrett's actions made our state and communities safer."

AGO SALUTES DNA Casework Section

The Crime Laboratory Division's DNA Casework Section, with the support of the CODIS Section, has played an integral role in the success of the Missouri Sexual Assault Kit Initiative Project. This nationwide initiative began in 2015 to help states inventory and test sexual assault forensic evidence (SAFE) kits and upload offender DNA profiles into a national database. States are then able to investigate and prosecute cases in which offender DNA profiles match existing records in the database. The Crime Lab Division has worked on this project in conjunction with the Missouri Attorney General's Office.

Criminalists III Amanda Paulus, Gretchen Hagen, and Diane Higgins, and Forensic Laboratory Technician II Caileigh O'Neal have worked diligently for the past three years to compile and report DNA profiling results for sexual assault kits processed under the MO

SAFE Kit Initiative. Throughout this time, the DNA Casework team has been instrumental in reviewing data, entering SAKI case information into the laboratory's LIMS system, vetting case information, entering profiles into the FBI's Combined DNA Index System (CODIS), writing reports, and reviewing reports. The dedication of the DNA Casework Section to the SAKI program has led to the entry of almost 1,000 case profiles into the CODIS database and resulted in over 400 CODIS hits to SAKI case profiles.

On June 1, 2023, Criminalist Supervisor Marcy Stiefel and Assistant Director Stacey Bolinger received SAFE Kit Initiative service awards from the Missouri Attorney General for their work on the SAKI project. Crim. Sprv. Stiefel serves as an advisor for the SAFETrack software which was developed by the AG's office to track kits from manufacture through collection, processing, and

storage. In addition, she advises the AG's office on potential software enhancements and assists with troubleshooting when problems arise. Asst. Dir. Bolinger serves in an advisory capacity to the AG's office and works to establish contracts for outsourcing the testing and review of sexual assault kits. Additionally, she assists with kit inventory by providing information on current backlogs within the laboratory system and testing performed on kits previously submitted to the laboratory. Asst. Dir. Bolinger served as chair for the testing subcommittee that set guidelines for kits to be tested under the grant. She also served on the SAFETrack development subcommittee and continues to serve as a member of the SAKI working group, which meets quarterly to review actions by the AG's office and advise on future actions.

CJIS TEAM MEETS FBI MANDATE

The Federal Bureau of Investigation mandated that all U.S. states begin utilizing a new National Information Exchange Model (NIEM) to interface with the National Crime Information Center (NCIC). Doing so ensures a consistent vocabulary across various applications and/or interfaces. This model had been applied to the NCIC and it was time for the next step. Hence, the FBI was tasking the Patrol with implementing the new NIEM NCIC Interface within the Missouri Uniform Law Enforcement System.

This daunting assignment was directed to the Application Development Section of the Criminal Justice Information Services Division and landed on the desks of Computer Info. Spec. Tech. II Todd D. Schneider, Computer Info. Tech. Spec. II Drew M. Wansing, and Computer Info. Tech. Spec. I Michelle L. Frey. One of their primary projects is the development of the MULES and the many interfaces that exchange criminal justice information with local, state, and federal partners.

The team worked many long hours to coordinate and implement the new interface within MULES and achieved their goal in October 2022. They went above and beyond on a daily basis and worked nights, weekends, and during scheduled vacations. The FBI confirmed that Missouri was the first in the nation to successfully

implement the NIEM NCIC interface requirements and congratulated the team for accomplishing such a smooth transition.

To recognize their work, the Department of Public Safety named them May 2023 Non-Sworn Team Members of the Month. Director Sandra K. Karsten presented certificates and challenge coins to each of them at a ceremony May 17, 2023.

implementation, the team has been assisting both the FBI and other states to help make their NIEM transition easier and more efficient.

Colonel Eric T. Olson congratulated the team and presented a superintendent's challenge coin to each of them. "Thank you for what you do for criminal justice in Missouri," said Col. Olson. "To accomplish this and then, to lead the nation, this is important
